RUGBY SCHOOL

Rugby School Chapels

The building was designed by the gothic revival Architect, William Butterfield in 1875 and the interior remains as it was constructed. The smaller Memorial Chapel which is linked to the main chapel was built as a memorial to those who lost their lives from the Rugby School community in the First World War. It was designed by Sir Charles Nicholson of School House (brother of Sir Sydney Nicholson, also School House, composer and sometime organist of Westminster Abbey, founder of the Royal School of Church Music) and consecrated in 1922.

The main Rugby School Chapel contains an organ by the firm Kenneth Jones and Associates of Bray, Ireland which was built in 2001 with additions and improvements by Nicholson Organ Builders of Worcester. It is a four manual instrument comprising fifty-four stops.

The Memorial Chapel contains an organ by Harrison and Harrison of Durham built in 1923. It is a two manual instrument of six stops.

Bilton Grange School Chapel

The mansion which forms the main school was built in 1846 attached to an existing farmhouse and was a private family home. It was designed by the eminent designer and architect Augustus Welby Pugin for Captain Washington Hibbert and is a Grade II* listed building. The first pupils were brought to the house by The Reverend Walter Earle in 1887. The brewhouse was converted into the school chapel in 1889 and classrooms were added in 1892.

The chapel contains an historic organ built by the London firm of Gray and Davison in 1892. The organ is a three manual instrument of nineteen stops and has been given an Historic Organ Certificate and listed as Grade II. It is in need of a major restoration!

Access to the Chapels for Services

Parents and visitors to services in Rugby School Chapel should enter the school via the Queen's Gate on Barby Road and the Chapel via either door on the north and south sides. The Memorial Chapel should be entered via the door on the left hand side of the chapel. Disabled parking only is available on 'The Porridge' close to the Chapel. Parents may park in Michell House car park in Little Church Street after 5.30pm and will be given the gate code.

Parents and visitors to services in Bilton Grange Chapel should enter the school via the School Reception at the North Entrance.



Evensong

The service of Evensong has been used in English churches for centuries and is unchanged for more than 300 years. It is designed to be a daily reminder and celebration of the Incarnation – the Christian belief that Almighty God became a human being to share our life and lead us back to the life of heaven with him. The service begins with sung responses and a selection from the psalms – ancient hymns of praise, petition, questioning and triumph. At the heart of the service are the two 'canticles': Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis. In the Magnificat, the choir sing the joyful words first uttered by a young girl, Mary, when she heard she was to be the mother of Jesus. The Nunc Dimittis is the song of an old man, Simeon, who had been promised that he would not die until he had seen God's chosen King with his own eyes. When they placed the baby Jesus in his arms, that ancient servant of the Lord knew that he could depart in peace.

The service includes two readings from God's word to us in the Bible, a declaration of our faith in the spoken words of the creed, and prayers for the world and for ourselves.

Over the centuries many of the world's greatest musicians have composed pieces known as 'settings' for use at Evensong. Every day the same, but every day different, Choral Evensong is truly one of the Church's treasures.

Rugby School Services

The whole school meets in chapel for morning prayers on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. On Sundays there is a more formal service with music sung by the Arnold Singers – a choir of pupils and staff. This service is followed by a short service of Holy Communion in the Memorial Chapel. Parents and visitors are welcome to join us for these Sunday services and for refreshments in School House afterwards.

The Arnold Singers sing the ancient monastic service of Compline on two evenings and the Temple Consort will also sing two Evensongs this term .

Rugby School Chapel Organ

This term we will be welcoming back the organ in Rugby School Chapel following some renovation work undertaken by Nicholson and Co. Organ Builders from Malvern. The organ suffered from some rain water damage last year and we are taking the opportunity, whilst repairs are carried out, to enhance the organ with some tonal improvements, including a new Tuba rank. The Readings for Choral Evensong in the Advent Term

This Advent Term we shall celebrate Choral Evensong in both Rugby School Chapels and Bilton Grange Chapel. We hope that, as last year, this will contribute to the richness of our school life.

It is customary at Choral Evensong to have two Bible readings: the first from the Old Testament and the second from the New Testament. This term we shall hear some of the important events and be introduced to some important figures in the history of Israel, from the Patriarch Abraham to the Fall of the Northern Kingdom in 722 BC, the Fall of the Southern Kingdom in 586 BC, and the Exile in Babylon. At the end of the Advent Term we listen to the prophets who told of the coming of a future Messiah. This will prepare us for the school carol services which are such a joyful time as we look forward to the birth of Jesus at Christmas.

The New Testament readings are taken from the Gospel of Mark, the shortest and earliest of the Gospels, Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. We shall listen to stories about the healing and teaching ministry of Jesus.

There will be some days when the Church celebrates important Feast Days: Friday 13th September, Holy Cross Day; Monday 30th September, St Michael and All Angels; Thursday 17th October, Luke the Evangelist: Monday 11th November, Armistice Day; Friday 22nd November, St Cecilia. Friday 29th November, Andrew the Apostle. We shall keep these Feasts with the rest of the Church and use the special readings set for those days.

The Psalms at Evensong

One of the joys of Evensong is the singing of the psalms. These are a collection of 150 texts in the Old Testament which were attributed to King David but are now thought to be by various authors from the 9th to 5th Centuries BC. The Rugby Choristers at Bilton Grange aspire to singing the psalms appointed for each day in the Book of Common Prayer. During the learning process we have selected portions of psalms which we have appointed for each day across a four week cycle. The texts of these psalms are printed towards the end of this Service Booklet. All the psalms conclude with the Gloria:

Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Ghost; as it was in the beginning is now and ever shall be, world without end. Amen

Week 2A – Trinity 15

Tuesday 10 September

- Old Testament: Genesis 12.1-9 *God calls Abram and promises to make him the father of a great nation.*
- NewTestament: Mark 1.9-13 The baptism of Jesus in the river Jordan

Thursday 12 September

- Old Testament: Genesis 15. 1-6 and 18 21 *God makes a covenant with Abraham . Abraham will have many descendants. They will inherit a great land.*
- New Testament: Mark 1. 16 20 *Jesus calls disciples to follow him.*

Friday 13 September First EP of Holy Cross Day

- Old Testament: Isaiah 52. 13-15 *Isaiah describes the Servant who will be exalted and lifted up.*
- New Testament: John 3. 13 -17 *St John describes the Son of Man who will be lifted up.*

Sunday 15 September – Stanford Festival Evensong

- Old Testament: Isaiah 12.4 -6 Both readings this evening speak of the importance of singing. The prophet Isaiah speaks of a future for Israel which will be filled with songs of praise and singing.
- New Testament: Ephesians 5.18b 20 Paul tells the Christians at Ephesus to address one another in psalms and hymns and to sing with all their hearts to God.

Week 3B - Trinity 16

Monday 16 September

- Old Testament: Genesis 37. 1-4 and 23 28 *Joseph, a bright 17- year- old young man, the son of Jacob, is sold into Egypt by his brothers who are jealous of him.*
- New Testament: Mark 1. 21 28 *Jesus begins his teaching and healing ministry. He teaches in the synagogue at Capernaum and heals a man with an unclean spirit.*

Tuesday 17 September

- Old Testament: Genesis 47.1 12 *Joseph prospers in Egypt and comes to the attention of the Pharoah. He brings Jacob his father and his brothers to join him.*
- New Testament: Mark 1.29 -39 *Jesus continues to heal the sick and attracts the attention of the crowds.*

Thursday 19 September

- Old Testament: Hosea 6. 15b–6.3 *The healing power of God*
- NewTestament: Mark 1. 40-45 *Jesus has pity on a leper and heals him.*

Week 4C – Trinity 17

Monday 23 September

- Old Testament: Exodus 1. 8–14 *A new Pharaoh in Egypt didn't know Joseph and turned against the Israelites and put them to forced labour building store cities.*
- New Testament: Mark 2. 1-12 *Jesus continues his ministry of teaching and healing the sick.*

Tuesday 24 September (Temple Consort)

- Old Testament: Exodus 3. 1-12 *God appears to Moses in the burning bush. God has seen the suffering of his people in Egypt*
- New Testament: Mark 2. 23–26 *The disciples pluck corn on the sabbath which leads to the Pharisees trying to entrap Jesus on the keeping of the sabbath day.*

Thursday 26 September

- Old Testament: Exodus 3. 13–22 *God reveals to Moses his name and his intention to lead the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt and the role for Moses in God's plan.*
- New Testament: Mark 3. 7–19 *The crowds follow Jesus to see his healing. Jesus appoints 12 disciples.*

Friday 27 September - St Michael and All Angels

- Old Testament: Exodus 15. 1-12 *Moses leads Israel out of Egypt across the Red Sea and they sing a song to the Lord in thanksgiving for their deliverance.*
- New Testament: Mark 4. 1-20 *Jesus teaches in parables. The parable of the Sower*

Week 5A – Trinity 18

Monday 30 September

- Old Testament: Genesis 28. 10–17 *Jacob dreams of angels ascending and descending on a ladder to and from heaven.*
- New Testament: John 1. 47–51 *Jesus says to Nathanael that he will see angels ascending and descending to heaven.*

Tuesday 1 October

- Old Testament: Exodus 20. 1-16 Moses receives the 10 Commandments on Mount Sinai.
- New Testament: Mark 4. 26-34 *Jesus teaches in more parables about the kingdom of God.*

Thursday 3 October

- Old Testament: Deuteronomy 34. 1-12 Moses sees the Land God has promised from Mount Nebo but does not cross into the Promised Land.
- New Testament: Mark 5. 21–34 *Jesus continues to heal the sick and greater and greater crowds of people come to see him.*

Friday 4 October

- Old Testament: Joshua 1. 1-9 *Joshua is the one who leads the people into the Promised Land.*
- New Testament: Mark 5. 35-end *Jesus heals the daughter of the ruler of the Synagogue, Jairus.*

Week 6B – Trinity 19

Monday 7 October

- Old Testament: 1 Samuel 3. 1-10 and 19–21 *The call of Samuel to be a prophet of the Lord.*
- New Testament: Mark 6. 6b-13 *Jesus continues to teach and sends out the twelve disciples to carry on his teaching and healing ministry.*

Tuesday 8 October

- Old Testament: 1 Samuel 8. 4–9 and 19–22a *The elders of Israel ask Samuel to appoint a king over them like the kings of other nations.*
- New Testament: Mark 6. 30-44 *The feeding of the five thousand.*

Thursday 10 October

- Old Testament: 1 Samuel 15. 10 and 11, and 16. 1 and 6–13 *Saul, Israel's first king, transgresses the commandments of the Lord and Samuel anoints the young shepherd boy, David, as king.*
- New Testament: Mark 6. 45-end *Jesus comes to his disciples walking on the water and stills the storm.*

Friday 11 October

- Old Testament: 2 Samuel 5. 1-5 *The elders of Israel make a covenant with David recognising him as prince over all Israel.*
- New Testament: Mark 7. 1-13 *The Pharisees question the way Jesus' disciples observe the sabbath day and Jesus reflects on sabbath day observance.*

Week 7C – Trinity 20

Monday 14 October

- Old Testament: 2 Samuel 5. 6-10 David captures Jerusalem/Zion, the City of David
- New Testament: Mark 7. 14-23 *Jesus continues to teach his disciples*

Tuesday 15 October

- Old Testament: Samuel 6. 12-19 *David brings the ark to Jerusalem with much rejoicing.*
- New Testament: Mark 7. 24–30 *Jesus continues his healing ministry and heals the Syro-Phoenician woman.*

Thursday 17 October – First EP of St Luke the Evangelist

- Old Testament: Ecclesiasticus 38. 1-8 *writer describes the work of a physician.*
- New Testament: Timothy 3. 10-end *Paul gives advice to those who would live a godly life to remember the sacred writings (which come to include those of St Luke the Evangelist) for all scripture is inspired by God.*

Week 8A – All Saints / 4 before Advent

Monday 4 November

- Old Testament: 1 Kings 2. 1-4 and 10–12 *David's last words to his son Solomon who takes over the kingship of Israel.*
- New Testament: Mark 7. 31–end *Jesus heals the one who is deaf and has a speech impediment.*

Tuesday 5 November

- Old Testament: 1 Kings 8. 12–21 *Solomon builds the Temple in Jerusalem.*
- New Testament: Mark 8. 1-9 *Jesus again feeds the crowd that has followed him.*

Thursday 7 November (No Evensong)

Friday 8 November

- Old Testament: 1 Kings 11. 26–39 *After king Solomon the kingdom is divided into North and South, Israel and Judah.*
- New Testament: Mark 8. 11-21 *The Pharisees argue with Jesus and the disciples still do not understand the feeding of the crowd.*

Week 9B - 3 before Advent

Monday 11 November - Armistice Day

- Old Testament: Isaiah 2. 1-5 *Isaiah looks to a time when many peoples would go up to Jerusalem and there would be peace among the nations.*
- New Testament: John 15. 9-17 *Jesus's commandment that we should love one another as he has loved us.*

Tuesday 12 November

- Old Testament: 2 Kings 25. 8-12 *The Fall of the Southern Kingdom Judah in 586 BC to Babylonia and some leaders and people taken captives are deported to Babylon.*
- New Testament: Mark 9. 14–29 *Jesus heals a deaf and dumb man.*

Thursday 14 November

- Old Testament: Ezekiel 39. 25-29 *The Prophet Ezekiel tells the Exiles in Babylon that God will lead them back to their own land and to Jerusalem.*
- New Testament: Mark 10. 17–22 *Jesus tells his disciples to care for the poor.*

Saturday 16 November (Chorister Experience Day)

- 2. For the Lord is high, and to be feared: he is the great King upon all the earth.
- 3. He shall subdue the people under us: and the nations under our feet.
- 4. He shall choose out an heritage for us: even the worship of Jacob, whom he loved.
- 5. God is gone up with a merry noise: and the Lord with the sound of the trump.
- O sing praises, sing praises unto our God: O sing praises, sing praises unto our King.
- 7. For God is the King of all the earth: sing ye praises with understanding.
- 8. God reigneth over the heathen: God sitteth upon his holy seat.
- 9. The princes of the people are joined unto the people of the God of Abraham: for God, which is very high exalted, doth defend the earth, as it were with a shield.

Monday Week C

Psalm 48

Magnus Dominus

- 1. Great is the Lord, and highly to be praised : in the city of our God, even upon his holy hill.
- 2. The hill of Sion is a fair place, and the joy of the whole earth : upon the north-side lieth the city of the great King; God is well known in her palaces as a sure refuge.
- 3. For lo, the kings of the earth : are gathered, and gone by together.

- 4. They marvelled to see such things : they were astonished, and suddenly cast down.
- 5. Fear came there upon them, and sorrow : as upon a woman in her travail.
- 6. Thou shalt break the ships of the sea : through the east-wind.
- Like as we have heard, so have we seen in the city of the Lord of hosts, in the city of our God : God upholdeth the same for ever.
- 8. We wait for thy loving-kindness, O God : in the midst of thy temple.
- 9. O God, according to thy Name, so is thy praise unto the world's end : thy right hand is full of righteousness.
- 10. Let the mount Sion rejoice, and the daughter of Judah be glad : because of thy judgements.
- **11**. Walk about Sion, and go round about her : and tell the towers thereof.
- 12. Mark well her bulwarks, set up her houses : that ye may tell them that come after.
- 13. For this God is our God for ever and ever : he shall be our guide unto death.

Tuesday Week C

Psalm 49

Audite haec, omnes

- O HEAR ye this, all ye people: ponder it with your ears, all ye that dwell in the world;
- 2. High and low, rich and poor: one with another.
- 3. My mouth shall speak of wisdom: and my heart shall muse of understanding.
- 4. I will incline mine ear to the parable: and shew my dark speech upon the harp.
- 5. Wherefore should I fear in the days of wickedness: and when the wickedness of my heels compasseth me round about?

- 6. There be some that put their trust in their goods: and boast themselves in the multitude of their riches.
- But no man may deliver his brother: nor make agreement unto God for him;
- 8. For it cost more to redeem their souls: so that he must let that alone for ever;
- 9. Yea, though he live long: and see not the grave.
- 10. For he seeth that wise men also die, and perish together: as well as the ignorant and foolish, and leave their riches for other.
- 11. And yet they think that their houses shall continue for ever: and that their dwelling-places shall endure from one generation to another; and call the lands after their own names.
- 12. Nevertheless, man will not abide in honour:seeing he may be compared unto the beasts that perish; this is the way of them.
- This is their foolishness: and their posterity praise their saying.
- 14. They lie in the hell like sheep, death gnaweth upon them, and the righteous shall have domination over them in the morning: their beauty shall consume in the sepulchre out of their dwelling.
- 15. But God hath delivered my soul from the place of hell: for he shall receive me.
- 16. Be not thou afraid, though one be made rich: or if the glory of his house be increased;
- 17. For he shall carry nothing away with him when he dieth: neither shall his pomp follow him.
- For while he lived, he counted himself an happy man:
 and so long as thou doest well unto thyself, men will speak good of thee.
- **19**. He shall follow the generation of his fathers: and shall never see light.
- 20. Man being in honour hath no understanding: but is compared unto the beasts that perish.

Psalm 59

Eripe me de inimicis

- 1. DELIVER me from mine enemies, O God: defend me from them that rise up against me.
- 2. O deliver me from the wicked doers: and save me from the blood-thirsty men.
- 3. For lo, they lie waiting for my soul: the mighty men are gathered against me, without any offence or fault of me, O Lord.
- 4. They run and prepare themselves without my fault: arise thou therefore to help me, and behold.
- 5. Stand up, O Lord God of hosts, thou God of Israel, to visit all the heathen: and be not merciful unto them that offend of malicious wickedness.
- 6. They go to and fro in the evening: they grin like a dog, and run about through the city.
- 7. Behold, they speak with their mouth, and swords are in their lips: for who doth hear?
- 8. But thou. O Lord, shalt have them in derision: and thou shalt laugh all the heathen to scorn.
- 9. My strength will I ascribe unto thee: for thou art the God of my refuge.
- God sheweth me his goodness plenteously: and God shall let me see my desire upon mine enemies.
- Slay them not, lest my people forget it:
 but scatter them abroad among the people, and put them down, O Lord, our defence.
- For the sin of their mouth, and for the words of their lips, they shall be taken in their pride: and why? their preaching is of cursing and lies.
- 13. Consume them in thy wrath, consume them, that they may perish:and know that it is God that ruleth in Jacob, and unto the ends of the world.

- 14. And in the evening they will return: grin like a dog, and will go about the city.
- 15. They will run here and there for meat: and grudge if they be not satisfied.
- 16. As for me, I will sing of thy power, and will praise thy mercy betimes in the morning: for thou hast been my defence and refuge in the day of my trouble.
- 17. Unto thee, O my strength, will I sing: for thou, O God, art my refuge, and my merciful God.

Psalm 60

Deus, repulisti nos

- 1. O God, thou hast cast us out, and scattered us abroad : thou hast also been displeased; O turn thee unto us again.
- 2. Thou hast moved the land, and divided it : heal the sores thereof, for it shaketh.
- 3. Thou hast shewed thy people heavy things : thou hast given us a drink of deadly wine.
- 4. Thou hast given a token for such as fear thee : that they may triumph because of the truth.
- 5. Therefore were thy beloved delivered : help me with thy right hand, and hear me.
- 6. God hath spoken in his holiness, I will rejoice and divide Sichem : and mete out the valley of Succoth.
- Gilead is mine, and Manasses is mine : Ephraim also is the strength of my head; Judah is my law-giver;
- 8. Moab is my wash-pot; over Edom will I cast out my shoe : Philistia, be thou glad of me.
- 9. Who will lead me into the strong city : who will bring me into Edom?
- 10. Hast not thou cast us out, O God : wilt not thou, O God, go out with our hosts?
- 11. O be thou our help in trouble : for vain is the help of man.

 Through God will we do great acts : for it is he that shall tread down our enemies.

Psalm 61

Exaudi, Deus

- 1. Hear my crying, O God : give ear unto my prayer.
- 2. From the ends of the earth will I call upon thee : when my heart is in heaviness.
- 3. O set me up upon the rock that is higher than I : for thou hast been my hope, and a strong tower for me against the enemy.
- 4. I will dwell in thy tabernacle for ever : and my trust shall be under the covering of thy wings.
- 5. For thou, O Lord, hast heard my desires : and hast given an heritage unto those that fear thy Name.
- 6. Thou shalt grant the King a long life : that his years may endure throughout all generations.
- 7. He shall dwell before God for ever :O prepare thy loving mercy and faithfulness, that they may preserve him.
- 8. So will I alway sing praise unto thy Name : that I may daily perform my vows.

Thursday Week B

Psalm 78

Attendite, popule

- Hear my law, O my people: incline your ears unto the words of my mouth.
- 2. I will open my mouth in a parable: I will declare hard sentences of old;
- 3. Which we have heard and known: and such as our fathers have told us;
- 4. That we should not hide them from the children of the generations to come: but to shew the honour of the Lord, his mighty and wonderful works that he hath done.

- 5. He made a covenant with Jacob, and gave Israel a law: which he commanded our forefathers to teach their children;
- 6. That their posterity might know it: and the children which were yet unborn;
- 7. To the intent that when they came up: they might shew their children the same;
- That they might put their trust in God: and not to forget the works of God, but to keep his commandments;
- 9. And not to be as their forefathers, a faithless and stubborn generation: a generation that set not their heart aright, and whose spirit cleaveth not stedfastly unto God;
- Like as the children of Ephraim: who being harnessed, and carrying bows, turned themselves back in the day of battle.
- 11. They kept not the covenant of God: and would not walk in his law;
- 12. But forgat what he had done: and the wonderful works that he had shewed for them.
- **13**. Marvellous things did he in the sight of our forefathers, in the land of Egypt: even in the field of Zoan.
- 14. He divided the sea, and let them go through: he made the waters to stand on an heap.
- 15. In the day-time also he led them with a cloud: and all the night through with a light of fire.
- He clave the hard rocks in the wilderness:
 and gave them drink thereof, as it had been out of the great depth.
- 17. He brought waters out of the stony rock: so that it gushed out like the rivers.
- Yet for all this they sinned more against him: and provoked the most Highest in the wilderness.
- **19**. They tempted God in their hearts: and required meat for their lust.
- 20. They spake against God also, saying: Shall God prepare a table in the wilderness?

- 21. He smote the stony rock indeed, that the waters gushed out, and the streams flowed withal: but can he give bread also, or provide flesh for his people?
- 22. When the Lord heard this, he was wroth: so the fire was kindled in Jacob, and there came up heavy displeasure against Israel;
- 23. Because they believed not in God: and put not their trust in his help.
- 24. So he commanded the clouds above: and opened the doors of heaven.
- 25. He rained down manna also upon them for to eat: and gave them food from heaven.
- 26. So man did eat angels' food: for he sent them meat enough.
- 27. He caused the east-wind to blow under heaven: and through his power he brought in the south-west-wind.
- 28. He rained flesh upon them as thick as dust: and feathered fowls like as the sand of the sea.
- **29**. He let it fall among their tents: even round about their habitation.
- 30. So they did eat and were well filled, for he gave them their own desire: they were not disappointed of their lust.
- 31. But while the meat was yet in their mouths, the heavy wrath of God came upon them, and slew the wealthiest of them: yea, and smote down the chosen men that were in Israel.
- 32. But for all this they sinned yet more: and believed not his wondrous works.
- 33. Therefore their days did he consume in vanity: and their years in trouble.
- 34. When he slew them, they sought him: and turned them early, and inquired after God.
- 35. And they remembered that God was their strength: and that the high God was their redeemer.
- **36**. Nevertheless, they did but flatter him with their mouth: and dissembled with him in their tongue.

- 37. For their heart was not whole with him: neither continued they stedfast in his covenant.
- 38. But he was so merciful, that he forgave their misdeeds: and destroyed them not.
- 39. Yea, many a time turned he his wrath away: and would not suffer his whole displeasure to arise.
- 40. For he considered that they were but flesh: and that they were even a wind that passeth away, and cometh not again.
- **41**. Many a time did they provoke him in the wilderness: and grieved him in the desert.
- 42. They turned back, and tempted God: and moved the Holy One in Israel.
- 43. They thought not of his hand:and of the day when he delivered them from the hand of the enemy;
- 44. How he had wrought his miracles in Egypt: and his wonders in the field of Zoan.
- **45**. He turned their waters into blood: so that they might not drink of the rivers.
- **46**. He sent lice among them, and devoured them up: and frogs to destroy them.
- 47. He gave their fruit unto the caterpillar: and their labour unto the grasshopper.
- **48**. He destroyed their vines with hail-stones: and their mulberry trees with the frost.
- **49**. He smote their cattle also with hail-stones: and their flocks with hot thunderbolts.
- 50. He cast upon them the furiousness of his wrath, anger, displeasure, and trouble: and sent evil angels among them.
- 51. He made a way to his indignation, and spared not their soul from death: but gave their life over to the pestilence;
- 52. And smote all the first-born in Egypt: the most principal and mightiest in the dwellings of Ham.

- 53. But as for his own people, he led them forth like sheep: and carried them in the wilderness like a flock.
- 54. He brought them out safely, that they should not fear: and overwhelmed their enemies with the sea.
- 55. And brought them within the borders of his sanctuary: even to his mountain which he purchased with his right hand.
- 56. He cast out the heathen also before them: caused their land to be divided among them for an heritage, and made the tribes of Israel to dwell in their tents.
- 57. So they tempted and displeased the most high God: and kept not his testimonies;
- 58. But turned their backs, and fell away like their forefathers: starting aside like a broken bow.
- 59. For they grieved him with their hill-altars: and provoked him to displeasure with their images.
- 60. When God heard this, he was wroth: and took sore displeasure at Israel.
- 61. So that he forsook the tabernacle in Silo: even the tent that he had pitched among men.
- 62. He delivered their power into captivity: and their beauty into the enemy's hand.
- 63. He gave his people over also unto the sword: and was wroth with his inheritance.
- 64. The fire consumed their young men: and their maidens were not given to marriage.
- 65. Their priests were slain with the sword: and there were no widows to make lamentation.
- 66. So the Lord awaked as one out of sleep: and like a giant refreshed with wine.
- 67. He smote his enemies in the hinder parts: and put them to a perpetual shame.
- 68. He refused the tabernacle of Joseph: and chose not the tribe of Ephraim;

- 69. But chose the tribe of Judah: even the hill of Sion which he loved.
- 70. And there he built his temple on high: and laid the foundation of it like the ground which he hath made continually.
- 71. He chose David also his servant: and took him away from the sheep-folds.
- 72. As he was following the ewes great with young ones he took him: that he might feed Jacob his people, and Israel his inheritance.
- 73. So he fed them with a faithful and true heart: and ruled them prudently with all his power.

Psalm 130

De profundis

- Out of the deep have I called unto thee, O Lord : Lord, hear my voice.
- 2. 2. O let thine ears consider well : the voice of my complaint.
- 3. 3. If thou, Lord, wilt be extreme to mark what is done amiss : O Lord, who may abide it?
- 4. 4. For there is mercy with thee : therefore shalt thou be feared.
- 5. 5. I look for the Lord; my soul doth wait for him : in his word is my trust.
- 6. My soul fleeth unto the Lord : before the morning watch, I say, before the morning watch.
- 7. 7. O Israel, trust in the Lord, for with the Lord there is mercy : and with him is plenteous redemption.
- 8. 8. And he shall redeem Israel : from all his sins.

The Rugby Choristers at Bilton Grange

The Rugby Choristers at Bilton Grange consists of a choir of girl choristers and a choir of boy choristers who sing separately alongside adult, professional singers and choral scholars in the Chapel at Rugby School as well as singing by themselves in Bilton Grange School Chapel.

Children are able to join the programme in Years 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 remaining until the age of 13 (the end of Year 8).

All choristers attend Bilton Grange Preparatory School, where they receive an education either as day or boarding pupils. Means tested support can be provided. Choristers receive free tuition on two musical instruments in addition to their singing.

Lay Clerks and Choral Scholars

Evensong at Rugby School is sung by the Rugby Choristers at Bilton Grange together with the Lay Clerks and Choral Scholars of Rugby School. Lay Clerks are members of staff or freelance professional singers, whilst the Choral Scholars are students of Rugby School who may be music scholars and working towards a Choral Scholarship at university.
